"Investigating the Determinants of Local Content Policy in G- 20 Countries"

Domestic companies play a vital economic role through job creation, innovation, and overall growth. By leveraging local resources and understanding local consumer preferences, they contribute to national self-sufficiency and economic resilience. The concept of local content further promotes the use of domestic goods and services to support sustainable development. In this context, current research examines the factors affecting the local content policy for G- 20 countries for the time period 2002 – 2021 while using the number of listed companies as the index measure of local content. This research employs panel data regression analysis to investigate relationships between domestic companies and variables, including corruption, exports, imports, foreign direct investment, political stability, research and development expenditures, economic growth, and tariffs. Key findings show corruption and growth are inversely related to the numbers of listed domestic firms, while import values, political stability, R&D spending, and tariffs are positively associated. This research provides valuable insights for promoting local content and developing policies to effectively leverage domestic companies for innovation-driven, inclusive, and sustainable economic development.

Abstract

The global upheaval caused by the outbreak of the COVID-19 virus had far-reaching repercussions, profoundly impacting various sectors, including education. In response to this unprecedented situation, the Southern Philippines Agribusiness Marine and Aquatic Schools of Technology (SPAMAST) swiftly adopted a modular learning system. Employing a validated interview-guide questionnaire administered online, the research endeavor sought to gather pertinent information from the participants. Subsequent data analysis was executed through meticulous coding and thematic analysis.

The research findings cast light on a multitude of impactful observations. Students encountered the burdensome weight of adhering to multiple module deadlines, which induced considerable pressure. Learners characterized by inadequate reading comprehension and constrained vocabulary struggled to decipher the module content. The exacerbation of challenges stemming from limited and erratic internet connectivity further compounded the intricacies of submitting assignments and fulfilling course requirements. Furthermore, certain students expressed disenchantment with the self-directed learning mode, attributing their dissatisfaction to the scarcity of feedback from instructors. Notably, the modular learning framework emerged as less suitable for student-mothers, who were juggling diverse responsibilities. The implications of this study resonate both within the confines of SPAMAST and across the broader landscape of social work education. The research underscores the imperative for enhancing the prowess of social work educators in developing proficiently tailored and effective professional modules, particularly in the face of crises such as the ongoing pandemic.

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
